

Alexander KAIMBACHER Tenor

Alexander Kaimbacher is born in Villach, he studied Musicology, German Philology and Dramatics at the University Vienna, as well as Singing at the Conservatory, Waldorf Pedagogics and Acting. His singing teachers were Hilde Roessel-Majdan and Bernhard Adler; he took part in master classes with D. Fischer-Dieskau, C. Zacharia and N. Gedda. Until 2011 he was ensemble member at Staatsoper **Vienna**, where he sang roles such as Steuermann, Jaquino, Tanzmeister and Brighella, Monostatos, 1° and 2° Jude, Edmondo in "Manon Lescaut", Victorian in "Tote Stadt", Valzacchi, Triquet, Spoletta.
